RE: EAP / ESL Articulation Agreement

First let me say thank you to everyone who was involved in the review and consultation process that have resulted in the development of the EAP/ESL Articulation Agreement. Your collective efforts are a reflection of the collaborative work that our Councils undertake each year. They also reflect our focus on student success and student mobility. Together we are able to build stronger pathways for our international students and make Ontario colleges a first choice for those wanting to pursue post-secondary in Ontario. It is because of your hard work that I am able to share with you this memo requesting your assistance to gather approval signatures officially endorsing the EAP/ESL Articulation Agreement.

Agreement Background:

For many years, many of the accredited Ontario College EAP programs have participated in an informal, reciprocal articulation arrangement whereby students who had successfully graduated from an EAP/ESL program to another Ontario College, were admitted to another College's diploma, degree and graduate certificate programs without needing to complete further, expensive, pre-admission language testing. In 2012, the ESL sub-committee members of the Ontario College Language and Communications Council (OCLCC) moved to formalize this process through an intense mapping of all eligible EAP programs. In total, 14 of the Ontario Colleges participated and were deemed eligible. The proposal was then presented to and sought the endorsement of the respective college Registrars, Heads of International, Heads of Interdisciplinary Studies and was finally presented as a formal recommendation to the Coordinating Committee of the Vice Presidents Academic.

Official Sign-Off:

To facilitate receiving official approval, this memo is being circulated to the Associate Deans, Chairs, Directors and/or Coordinators of the EAP / ESL Programs at the participating Colleges. They in turn are being asked to share it with their Registrar and Vice President Academic seeking their signature. Three signatures are being requested to ensure that all of the relevant College representatives endorse this agreement and can operationalize it immediately:

- 1. Vice President Academic
- 2. Registrar
- 3. EAP/ESL Associate Dean, chair, Director, Manager and/or Coordinator

Once all signatures have been obtained, please ensure that the signed memo is returned to Paula Gouveia at Humber College no later than May 1, 2014. If you require a copy of the full report, please visit the Heads of Interdisciplinary Studies website (http://www.hois.ca/language/csl/).

Next Steps from OCLCC

The Language Council recognizes that there is significant interest form Colleges to see this agreement expanded. Several institutions were in the process of developing EAP / ESL programs and have indicated that they would like their curriculum reviewed. Others have indicated that while they do not intend to develop EAP/ESL programs, they would still like to review the curriculum and become a receiving institution. OCLCC will be formalizing the review process and establishing a review cycle to capture this as well as any curriculum revisions. This will be developed during their Annual General Membership meeting in May 2014 and communicated through Heads of Interdisciplinary Studies to the college community.

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

ONTARIO COLLEGE ENGLISH FOR ACADI MIC PURPOSES/ENGLISH AS A SECOND LANGUAGE ARTICULATION

Agreement among

Member Colleges of the Ontario College Language and Communication Council (OCLCC)

1. Purpose

The purpose of this Memorandum of Understanding (hereinafter "MOU") is to declare the joint intention of OCLCC to establish and maintain an Ontario College English for Academic Purposes/English as a Second Language Articulation Agreement to facilitate students' admission to post-secondary programs after completing EAP/ESL programs at colleges that are signers of this agreement. This is intended to provide clearer recognition of students' learning as well as of the level of EAP/ESL education. It will support international and domestic students' progress through their education and enhance Ontario as a destination for post-secondary education.

2. Background

For the past 11 years, many of the accredited Ontario College EAP programs have participated in an informal, reciprocal articulation arrangement whereby Coordinators/Chairs would assist in facilitating applications for admission of students who had successfully graduated from their college's EAP program to another Ontario college's certificate, diploma and advanced diploma programs. As is currently done with articulated private schools, this arrangement negated the need for further, expensive, pre-admission language assessment and provided students with better service and transition into their chosen program of studies. In 2012, the ESL sub-committee members of OCLCC moved to formalize this process through an intense mapping of all eligible EAP programs. In total, 15 of the Ontario Colleges participated and were deemed eligible. The proposal was then forwarded to the respective college Registrars. Registrars and those International Dept. Chairs who were contacted were in favour of this moving forward.

3. Objective

3.1 This document permits graduates of the participating colleges to satisfy the English language proficiency requirements for entrance into certificate, diploma and advanced diploma programs at the participating colleges by demonstrating successful completion of the EAP / ELI program with the minimum grades listed in Appendix A.

3.2 This agreement will replace the students' needs to have to write a standardized English proficiency test for entrance, although the student may still be required to complete any assessment normally required for placement into an appropriate level in that college's sequence of Communication or other courses.

3.3 Where students are seeking admission to overly subscribed programs of study, students may be required to complete admission testing or attend other admission related events, such as but not limited to interviews, auditions, and portfolio presentations as specified in the admissions criteria and process documents of the receiving institution.

3.4 Meeting the minimum admission requirements does not guarantee admission to a program.

3.5 This articulation agreement also includes admission into programs that have a field experience or co-operative education component but does not excuse students from meeting any additional criteria that may be required of students seeking to participate in that experience.

3.6 Included as an appendix to this document is a list of the fifteen participating colleges and the exit criteria set by the participating EAP/ESL schools. The exit criteria have been reviewed and are judged to be sufficient by the members of the OCLCC for entrance into the participating colleges' diploma programs.

4. Agreement

4.1 Graduation from the EAP/ESL program in colleges that have signed this agreement is deemed sufficient for admission to post-secondary programs at other colleges that have signed without further admission testing in English. Each college reserves the right to select those programs to which this articulation applies. Further testing for placement or to meet other admission criteria is not affected by this articulation. The agreement will take effect May 1, 2014.

4.2 When signed by members of CCPVA, this agreement confirms commitment by their individual colleges to this articulation. Copies of signed agreements will be held by each participating college as well as by the Heads of Interdisciplinary Studies on behalf of the OCLCC.

Duration, Disputes and Cancellations

5.1 This agreement will be in force for 5 years from the date of the first college signature. It may be renewed or revised at the end of that period. Any college may withdraw from the agreement with 60 days' written notice to the Chairs of CCVPA and OCLCC. In this event, to avoid disadvantaging students who have made educational plans based on this articulation, each signing college agrees that the articulation will be honoured for applicants who have already applied to that college through the Ontario College Application Service (OCAS) and the cancellation will apply only those applying after the effective cancellation date (i.e, 60 days from the receipt of the letter).

5.2 In the event of a dispute, controversy or claim arising out of or relating to this MOU, or the breach, termination or invalidity thereof (a "dispute"), the member colleges shall use their best efforts to settle promptly such dispute through direct negotiation.

5.3 If the matter is not resolved by negotiation within 30 days of receipt of a written 'invitation to negotiate', the parties will attempt to resolve the dispute in good faith through an agreed Alternative Dispute Resolution (ADR) procedure, or in default of agreement, through an ADR procedure.

5.4 If the matter has not been resolved by an ADR procedure within 60 days of the initiation of that procedure, or if any party will not participate in an ADR procedure, the dispute may be referred to the "Duration of the Agreement" section referring to the process for termination
