Also looking at a Bachelor of Arts in Accounting and Economics. Noted that moving forward, all Arts programs will have co-ops. Once Seniors' Village is developed, there will be strong opportunities for collaboration and participation from Fleming students in PSW, Nursing, OTA, PTA, etc. Interested in considering how Fleming certificates may be integrated into Arts degrees for hands-on opportunities. Trent University Durham GTA	
S. Henderson	
 S. Henderson noted that there were 1,700 students enrolled at the Durham campus pre-Covid. Currently, enrollment is up to 2,947, with 400 new students starting for this spring's cohort. Suggested opportunities for joint-programming with Indigenous Studies. The most popular programs at the Durham campus include Policing and Community Well-Being, Computer Science (now offering Honours), and Child and Youth Studies. Two key programs to consider for pathway development: Logistics and Supply Chain Management (officially running as a B.A. and very popular with employers in the Durham region who a looking for graduates), and Communications (with options in Media Relations and Business Communications. Noted that the Durham campus currently does not have the capacity to run traditional science programs, however we are currently working on creating a program around Climate Communications. Discussions with C. Mooney on offering a part-time Bachelor of Education at Durham, with an emphasis on mature learners and individuals interested in teaching in the trades. T.
