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#### Introduction

In 2006, Sheridan signed an articulation agreement with The Haliburton School of the Arts at Fleming College admitting qualified certificate program students into the Craft and Design Advanced Diploma program. This agreement became null and void when the degree program was launched. We propose designing a new pathway agreement.

The Visual and Creative Arts Diploma program (VCAD) at Haliburton is made up of 12 foundation courses, two Gen Ed courses and a 15-week intensive certificate program in a specialization. This certificate is equivalent to two semesters of study. The courses build upon the foundation courses and focus on developing skills, integrating techniques and acquiring knowledge of studio practice. The program prepares students for more specialized studies. Three of these specializations prepare students for entry into the Bachelor of Craft and Design (BC&D) program: Fibre Arts, Glassblowing and Ceramics.

Our direct competition is with OCADU. Our goal is to create a more attractive offer to qualified graduates than has been made by OCADU. Please see Appendix D for the degree completion requirements in the OCADU agreement. ### **Gap Analysis**

Appendix A is a gap analysis which was prepared to assess the suitability of the VCAD graduates for admission with advanced standing to the BC&D program. The gap analysis maps program outcomes to evaluate competencies and determine the suitable placement of VCAD grads into the degree program. In some instances, we have included individual course codes from the VCAD program to support or illustrate the learning that may have not been captured in a program outcome.

The curriculum in the VCAD program covers fundamental art and design principles and builds critical skills such as design, drawing and media applications. Along with the intensive studio courses in Glass, Ceramics or Fibre, the students have the equivalency of the first year content of the BC&D program. Therefore, we propose admitting qualified graduates into the second year. Additional exemptions will be given for the following courses:

#### **Breadth Electives**

The VCAD graduates who have successfully completed two General Education electives with a minimum of 65% will be given credit for one breadth elective based on Sheridan's breadth policy. Qualified applicants will need to complete the ENGL17889GD Composition and Rhetoric course in advance of any breadth courses where it is a pre-requisite.

#### Interdisciplinary Project 1 DESN21473 (Term 3):

The content of this course and more importantly, the experience of collaborating in group projects have been introduced to the VCAD students in studio courses as well as in Design 1 ARTS960.

#### Expressive Drawing ARTS21799 (Term 3):

In addition to foundation level drawing, the VCAD program includes a studio specific drawing course (Fibre Arts – Drawing ARTS990, Drawing – Ceramics, ARTS972, Drawing – Glassblowing, ARTS993). The theory, skill and knowledge acquired in these courses would meet the learning outcomes of the BC&D Expressive Drawing ARTS21799.

### Studio Photography DSGN20049 (Term 4):

VCAD students take Visual Documentation ARTS963 which is primarily digital photography. They learn to produce images for documentation and presentation of their work in both print and digital formats. Studio lighting, composition and staging are considerations when composing an image. Images are edited on the computer and used for a variety of purposes including: portfolio, grant applications, marketing, etc. The content and learning outcomes in this course would be equivalent to the BC&D Studio Photography DSGN20049 course. VCAD students will be required to take a more advanced level photography course (Advanced Photography DSGN33672) in Term 5.

#### Ceramic History HIST21473, Glass History HIST26048, Textile History HIST22974 (Term 4)

The VCAD program includes a studio specific history course (Art History XIV: Glass ARTS1091, Fibre Arts History ARTS444, Art History XIII – Ceramics ARTS0971) similar to the one offered in the B&CD program. The content covers ceramic, glass and fibre art from early history to the present. Emphasis is placed on styles, cultures, techniques and significant artists. We propose exempting VCAD grads from the relevant BC&D studio history courses (Ceramic History HIST21473, Glass History HIST26048 and Textile History HIST22974).

#### Professional Practices BUSM33796 (Term 6)

VCAD students complete two business related courses in their program: Business for Artists (BUSN99)



and Marketing/Portfolio Development (MKTG53). These courses address many aspects of professional practice applied to craft and design practitioners such as financial structures, legal rights and responsibilities, contracts, setting goals, preparing a portfolio and writing artist statements. These two courses would prepare students for the additional two business courses in the BC&D program. The content and learning outcomes of these courses would be equivalent to the BC&D Professional Practices BUSM33796.

#### **Reach Back Course**

The gap analysis revealed one history course in the first year of BC&D program that the Haliburton students have not taken. Art & Design History 1 (HIST17028) covers early art history from the Renaissance to the Nineteenth Century. They will be required to take this course.

#### **Applicant Selection**

Eligible applicants are selected on the assessment of their previous academic achievement and the results of a portfolio assessment including a written statement of intent. A portfolio fee is required with submission.
