Background

This report describes the results of a survey of students who began classes during the 2018/2019 academic year but withdrew or stopped attending and did not return to Fleming in the following semester.

Methodology

The goal of this survey was to determine reasons why students withdrew from Fleming College in order to assist with the development of effective retention strategies.

Nature of Sample

The population for this survey included all full-time students registered in post-secondary programs at Fleming in Fall 2018, Winter 2019, or Summer 2019 who withdrew or stopped attending and did not return in the following semester.

Survey Design and Implementation

A telephone script was prepared by Institutional Research Office to determine reasons why students withdrew from Fleming College. The survey consisted of seven sections:

- I. Student's current activity
- II. Student's activity prior to attending Fleming
- III. Student's activity while attending Fleming
- IV. Reasons for withdrawal
- V. Use / satisfaction with service areas
- VI. Future plans
- VII. Satisfaction with Fleming experience

Sample Size and Limitations

The goal was to acquire responses representative of students who withdrew from Fleming College. Attempts were made to contact all students within this group.

The Table 1.0 is a summary of the response rate from the 2018/19 telephone survey.

Respondents to the telephone survey were representative of full-time students who withdrew or stopped attending Fleming during the 2018/2019 academic year and did not return in the following semester.

SUMMARY RESULTS FOR 2018/2019 (N = 135)

CURRENT ACTIVITY OF STUDENTS WHO WITHDREW

Current Activity

- Students were asked to report on what they were currently doing. Table 3.0 shows that 56% of students contacted in 2018/19 were currently working full-time and 22% were currently working part-time.
- The percentage of students working full-time was same as in 2017/18 whereas students working part-time increased by 9%.
- Six percent (6%) of students surveyed in 2018/19 indicated they were attending college, while none of them were attending university in 2018/19
- The percentage of students who indicated they were unemployed and seeking work has gone down by 2% compared to 2017/18

PRIOR TO ATTENDING FLEMING

Length of Time Away From an Educational Setting

- Table 4.0 shows that 49% of students contacted in 2018/19 had been away from an educational setting for less than one year, prior to attending Fleming; down by 10% from last year.
- Twenty-eight percent (28%) indicated that they have been away for 1 to 2 years and 23% had been away for 3 or more years in 2018/19.

Highest Level of Education Prior to Entering Fleming

- Seventy-two percent (72%) of the students contacted in 2018/19 had completed their high school diploma (grade 12 or 13) prior to attending Fleming, see table 5.0.
- Six percent (6%) of students indicated that they had some college and 17% indicated they had a college diploma in 2018/19.
- Two percent (2%) of students indicated they had some university education prior to entering Fleming other 2% had a university degree. While proportion of university graduates decreased compared to previous year, proportion of students with college diploma increased by 12% compared to previous year.

High School Subjects

- Forty-one percent (41%) of students contacted in 2018/19 indicated that most of their high school courses were taken at the college/general level (see table 6.0).
- Thirty-eight percent (38%) of students contacted in 2018/19 indicated that most of their high school courses were taken at the university/college level. This is an increase of 21% from the previous year.
- Thirteen percent (13%) of the students indicated that most of their high school courses were taken at either the university/advanced level in 2018/19. This is drop of 20% from the previous year.

WHILE ATTENDING FLEMING

Source of Income

- Table 7.0 shows the sources of income that students relied on while attending Fleming.
- Sixty-eight percent (68%) of students contacted in 2018/19 relied on student loan programs as a source of income while attending Fleming.
- Forty-four percent (44%) of students relied on part or full-time work while attending Fleming in 2018/19.
- Twenty-nine percent (29%) of students relied on their saving while attending Fleming in 2018/19, a 1% increase from last year

Employment Status While at Fleming

- Fifty-six percent (56%) of students contacted in 2018/19 indicated that they did NOT work while attending Fleming. Refer to table 8.0.
- Twenty-one percent (21%) of students worked less than 15 hours per week and 14% worked 16-24 hours per week in 2018/19.
- Nine percent (9%) of students were working more than 24 hours per week in 2018/19, a 1% decrease compared to 2017/18.

Fleming First Choice

- Table 9.0 shows that 85% of students contacted in 2018/19 reported that Fleming was their first-choice college.
- Seventy-eight (78%) of students contacted in 2018/19 indicated that the program they enrolled in was their first-choice program. See table 9.0.

First Time in College / Relocate

- Sixty-one percent (61%) of students surveyed in 2018/19 indicated that this was their first time in college.
- Forty-seven percent (47%) of students had to relocate in order to attend Fleming in 2018/19.

Extracurricular Activities / Orientation

- Thirteen percent (13%) of students were involved in extracurricular activities while attending Fleming in 2018/19.
- Eighty percent (80%) of students contacted in 2018/19 attended orientation.

REASONS FOR WITHDRAWAL

• Table 10.0 shows reasons that influenced students' decision to leave Fleming. The most common reasons for withdraw in 2018/19 health related problems (37%) and experienced too much stress (43%), wanted break from college studies (29%) and lost interest in the program (39%). These are common reasons over the years. Academic reasons for withdrawal has also gone up this year with major reasons being "course load too heavy/difficult (31%)" as well as missed too many classes / assignments.

MAIN Reason for Withdrawal

Students were asked to specify their MAIN reason for withdrawal. Table 11.0 shows that the top three reasons for withdrawal in the last 5 survey years were:

- ➤ Health related problems 22% in 2018/19. This has been the top concern in previous years as well.
- ➤ Lost interest in my academic program 13% in 2018/19 up by 6%.
- > Obtained full-time employment 7% in 2018/19 increased by 3% from the previous year

Decision to Withdraw

- Table 13.0 shows students comfort level with their decision to withdraw from Fleming.
- Fifty-seven percent (57%) of students indicated they were comfortable with their decision to withdraw from Fleming in 2018/19 while 34% had mixed feelings and 9% regretted their decision to withdraw from Fleming.

USE OF / SATISFACTION WITH FLEMING SERVICES

 Students were asked if they used five services areas and were to report their satisfaction level with the services they used. See table 14.0.

Use of Services

- The services students used most were Financial Aid (61% use rate) followed by students using Counselling & Advising were 25% & 18% respectively.
- Student use of Counselling and Health Services decreased by7% and 16% respectively; and increased use of Financial Aid by 13%; from 2017/18 to 2018/19.

Satisfaction With The Services

- The percentage of students who were very satisfied or satisfied with the service area used <u>increased</u> from 2016/17 to 2017/18 with:
 - Learning Support Services (90% to 96%)
 - Advising (91% to 96%)
- The percentage of students who were very satisfied or satisfied <u>decreased</u> with:
 - Financial Aid (89% to 79%)
 - Health Services (91% to 84%)

FUTURE PLANS

Future Plans - Post-Secondary Education

- Table 15.0 shows students plans for returning to their postsecondary education.
- The percentage of students who indicated that they planned to return to post-secondary education within six months decreased from 29% to 24%, and those who planned to return within 12 months; from 27% in 2017/18 to 20% in 2018/19.
- The percentage of students who said they would never return to post-secondary increased from 6% in 2017/18 to 9% in 2018/19.

Future Plans - Fleming College

- Students who indicated that they planned to return to postsecondary education in the future were asked their plans with Fleming. See table 16.0.
- Thirty-five percent (35%) of students planned on re-entering the same program on a full-time basis, 23% planned on beginning a different program on a full-time basis.
- Thirty percent (30%) of students surveyed in 2018/19 indicated that they had no plans for future involvement with Fleming, down 5% from the previous year.
- Twelve percent (12%) of students surveyed in 2018/19 indicated that they were undecided about their future involvement with Fleming.

Overall Satisfaction With Fleming Experience

- Students were asked to report their overall satisfaction with their experience while at Fleming. See table 18.0 for results.
- Thirty-nie percent (39%) of students surveyed in 2018/19 responded that they were "very satisfied" with their experience at Fleming and an additional 47% were "satisfied" with their experience.
- Eighty-six percent (86%) of students who were "very satisfied" or "satisfied" with their experience at Fleming in 2018/19.
